- C. Holidays in general, but especially Christmas
- D. Why do we long for home?
- E. What does Christmas have to do with coming home?
- F. How does Christ bring us home?

II. Exiled From Home

- A. Isaiah is prophesying to people in exile
 - 1. Isaiah 36-39 deliverance; failure
 - 2. Isaiah 39:5-7 exile to Babylon
 - 3. God speaks to these people in chapters 40-66
 - 4. v1-2 comfort them; speak tenderly exile is hard
 - 5. v1-2 hard service/warfare; sin; double = exile
- B. Exile a major motif in Scripture
 - 1. Genesis 3:23 banished from the Garden
 - 2. Genesis 12:1 Abram has to leave his homeland
 - 3. Same is true of Isaac and Jacob wandering
 - 4. Israel exiled in Egypt 400 years
 - 5. Israel's time in Babylon

- 6. This helps explain Israel's attachment to the land
- C. Our own age of exile
 - 1. Our age experiences more "exile" than any other
 - 2. Fewer people are born, live, and die at "home"
 - 3. Zygmunt Bauman world of tourists & vagabonds
 - 4. This has led to a crisis of place & restlessness

III. Jesus - Exiled In Our Place

- A. Exile and the coming of Christ
 - 1. The prophets looked for One Who would end exile
 - 2. Mark 1:1-3 Beginning of Gospel Isaiah text!
 - 3. Malachi 3:1 first part then the Lord comes!
 - 4. The Lord comes to bring us out of exile!
 - 5. Isa 40:4-5 When He comes we see His glory
 - 6. Mark continues this theme with baptism/wilderness
 - 7. But today we will look at infancy narratives
- B. Jesus the exile
 - 1. Luke 2:4-5 exiled because of census
 - 2. Luke 2:6-7 no room in the inn
 - 3. Matt 2:13-15 exiled to Egypt as the True Israel
 - 4. Matt 2:16-18 Herod kills the children; exile text
 - 5. Jeremiah 31:15-17 weeping; but exile is ending!

IV. Christmas - We Will Return Home!

- A. Our deepest exile
 - 1. Many of us experience a sense of exile
 - 2. Jesus too experienced physical exile
 - 3. But all of this points to a deeper, spiritual exile
 - 4. We know something is wrong and long for home
- B. The roots of our exile
 - 1. Our exile began when we fell in the Garden
 - 2. This was physically symbolized in exile from Eden
 - 3. Since then we have longed for a true home
 - 4. We know something is wrong and long for home
- C. Our futile attempts to end our exile
 - 1. To relieve this, many try to create utopia here
 - 2. But we can't do this ourselves we must be rescued
 - 3. The highway was for God to come to us to take us home
 - 4. There is no utopia in this time and place
- D. Our true need to be home with God
 - 1. This is what we truly seek all else are pointers
 - 2. CS Lewis quote
 - 3. We often try to stay busy and noisy to hide this
 - 4. Hebrews 11:16 God has fulfilled this longing

- 5. Christ has come and made the way
- 6. O Come, O Come Emmanuel
- E. Ending our Advent waiting with joy!
 - 1. Advent is a time of waiting, hoping, longing
 - 2. But it now concludes with joy!
 - 3. Christ has come and we are going home!
 - 4. Your deepest longings will be met and then some!
- F. Response Joy to the World!

Great Expectations - We Will Return Home

Isaiah 40:1-5 December 23, 2012 Joy To The World! Romans 15:13 5 Then Isaiah said to Hezekiah, "Hear the word of the Lord Almighty: 6 The time will surely come when everything in your palace, and all that your fathers have stored up until this day, will be carried off to Babylon. Nothing will be left, says the Lord. 7 And some of your descendants, your own flesh and blood who will be born to you, will be taken away, and they will become eunuchs in the palace of the king of Babylon." Isaiah 39:5–7

- 15 This is what the Lord says: "A voice is heard in Ramah, mourning and great weeping, Rachel weeping for her children and refusing to be comforted, because her children are no more." 16This is what the Lord says: "Restrain your voice from weeping and your eyes from tears, for your work will be rewarded," declares the Lord. "They will return from the land of the enemy. 17 So there is hope for your future," declares the Lord. "Your children will return to their own land.
