- E. But now we will look at John 17
  - 1. It is Jesus' longest prayer in Scripture
  - 2. It is prayed in the shadow of the Cross
  - 3. Shows the concerns which dominated Jesus' prayer
  - 4. We can learn much about prayer from John 17
- F. Today we being with a look at the prayer life of Jesus

## II. Jesus - The Man of Prayer

- A. After Jesus said this the context of Jesus' prayer

  After Jesus said this, he looked toward heaven and
  prayed: "Father, the time has come. Glorify your Son,
  that your Son may glorify you. John 17:1
  - 1. With these words John reminds us of the context
  - 2. Context night Jesus was betrayed (John 13-16)
  - 3. Immediate context end of Upper Room Discourse "You believe at last!" Jesus answered. <sup>32</sup> "But a time is coming, and has come, when you will be scattered, each to his own home. You will leave me all alone. Yet I am not alone, for my Father is with

me. <sup>33</sup> "I have told you these things, so that in me you may have peace. In this world you will have trouble. But take heart! I have overcome the world." John 16:31–33

- a. Jesus predicts the apostles will abandon Him
- b. But He is never alone the Father always with Him
  - 1. This awareness undergirds real prayer
  - 2. We must know the Father never abandons us
- c. This is critical, for in this world we have trouble
- d. But Jesus has overcome the world for us!
- 4. It is the time (literally hour) of Jesus' betrayal & death After Jesus said this, he looked toward heaven and prayed: "Father, the time has come. Glorify your Son, that your Son may glorify you. John 17:1
- B. He looked toward heaven and prayed Jesus prays!

  After Jesus said this, he looked toward heaven and prayed: "Father, the time has come. Glorify your Son, that your Son may glorify you. John 17:1
  - 1. In this dire hour Jesus prays
  - 2. He did not write letters, organize picket He prayed
  - 3. Is prayer my first option or last resort?
- C. Jesus the Man of Prayer
  - 1. Jesus did not begin to pray at this moment
  - 2. He lived a life of prayer
  - 3. Jesus' prayer life in Scripture

That evening after sunset the people brought to Jesus all the sick and demon-possessed. <sup>33</sup> The whole town gathered at the door, <sup>34</sup> and Jesus healed many who had various diseases. He also drove out many demons, but he would not let the demons speak because they knew who he was. <sup>35</sup> Very early in the morning, while it was still dark, Jesus got up, left the house and went off to a solitary place, where he prayed. <sup>36</sup> Simon and his companions went to look for him, <sup>37</sup> and when they found him, they exclaimed: "Everyone is looking for you!" Mark 1:32–37

- a. Jesus had been up late the night before
- b. People were clamoring for Jesus' attention
- c. But Jesus gave His attention prayer first thing

One of those days Jesus went out to a mountainside to pray, and spent the night praying to God. <sup>13</sup> When morning came, he called his disciples to him and chose twelve of them, whom he also designated apostles... Luke 6:12–13

- a. Momentous decision who would be the 12 apostles
- b. Jesus prepares by praying all night!
- c. He got alone to focus entirely on prayer
- d. He prayed all night used to regular prayer

After the people saw the miraculous sign that Jesus did, they began to say, "Surely this is the Prophet who is to come into the world." <sup>15</sup> Jesus, knowing that they intended to come and make him king by force, withdrew again to a mountain by himself. John 6:14–15

Immediately Jesus made his disciples get into the boat and go on ahead of him to Bethsaida, while he

dismissed the crowd. <sup>46</sup> After leaving them, he went up on a mountainside to pray. Mark 6:45–46

- a. Jesus had just fed the 5,000
- b. They like it and want to make Him King!
- c. A real temptation for Jesus Kingship without cross
- d. Jesus flees the temptation to pray (Mark 6)

Jesus went out as usual to the Mount of Olives, and his disciples followed him. <sup>40</sup> On reaching the place, he said to them, "Pray that you will not fall into temptation." <sup>41</sup> He withdrew about a stone's throw beyond them, knelt down and prayed, <sup>42</sup> "Father, if you are willing, take this cup from me; yet not my will, but yours be done." <sup>43</sup> An angel from heaven appeared to him and strengthened him. <sup>44</sup>And being in anguish, he prayed more earnestly, and his sweat was like drops of blood falling to the ground. <sup>45</sup> When he rose from prayer and went back to the disciples, he found them asleep, exhausted from sorrow. <sup>46</sup> "Why are you sleeping?" he asked them. "Get up and pray so that you will not fall into temptation." Luke 22:39–46

- a. Jesus in shadow of the cross bearing sins of world
- b. What does He do? He prays!
- c. This is intense prayer agony (literal), sweating
- d. In moment of temptation run to God in prayer
- e. Could I describe my prayers like this?
- 4. Truly Jesus is the man of prayer!

### III. The Surprise of Jesus' Prayer Life

- A. Consider Jesus God in the flesh, 2nd Person in Trinity
  - 1. He teaches authoritatively (Matthew 5-7, 7:28-29)

- 2. He speaks healing (Matthew 8:1-12)
- 3. He controls the weather (Matthew 14:22-33)
- 4. He drives out demons with a word (Mark 1:23-26)
- 5. He is Lord of the Sabbath (Mark 2:28)
- 6. He forgives sins (Matthew 9:6)
- 7. He is the Creator (John 1:3; Hebrews 1:10-12; Colossians 1:15-16)
- 8. He holds all things together (Colossians 1:17; Hebrews 1:3)
- 9. He is God in flesh (John 1:1-3, 14; Hebrews 1:8)
- B. Consider how much Jesus depended on God in prayer!
  - Jesus the God-Man recognized His utter dependence on God the Father
  - 2. When making decisions He prays for wisdom
  - 3. When tired He communes with Father in prayer
  - 4. When tempted with power & pride prays to God
  - 5. When tempted to take easy way prays to God

### IV. Applying the Word

- A. Do I pray like Jesus?
  - 1. Jesus is the God-Man 2nd Person of Trinity
  - 2. Yet, Jesus is the true Man of Prayer
  - 3. Do I pray like Jesus in every circumstance of life?

- 4. When faced with decision do I pray first & last?
- 5. When tired do I commune with God in prayer or watch TV?
- 6. When tempted do I run to God or temptation?

### B. Gospel praying

- 1. This is not a guilt inducing "You don't pray enough!"
- 2. It is a reminder that God is open to us
- 3. It is a reminder of how much we need God
- 4. It is a reminder that through the Gospel we have open access to pray just like Jesus
