

Disciples, Followers, Apprentices of the Master

Key idea:

Jesus is calling a community of disciples/followers/apprentices to learn from His teachings, be transformed to have His character, and imitate His practices and life rhythms.

Key text:

Mark 1:16-20

As Jesus walked beside the Sea of Galilee, he saw Simon and his brother Andrew casting a net into the lake, for they were fishermen. ¹⁷ "Come, follow me," Jesus said, "and I will make you fishers of men." ¹⁸ At once they left their nets and followed him. ¹⁹When he had gone a little farther, he saw James son of Zebedee and his brother John in a boat, preparing their nets. ²⁰ Without delay he called them, and they left their father Zebedee in the boat with the hired men and followed him.

Key points:

- 1. Discipleship is a key theme in Mark's Gospel, but it is often misunderstood today.
- There are several key things we need to understand regarding the teaching of the New Testament on being disciples/followers/apprentices of Jesus.
 Specifically, disciples/followers/apprentices of Jesus:
 - a. learn from the teaching of the Master
 - b. learn from the character of the Master
 - c. learn from the practices & life rhythms of the Master
 - d. learn from the Master in community

Questions for discussion/application:

1. What part of Sunday's teaching stood out most to you? Why?

- 2. When I hear the word "disciple" what comes to my mind? Do I get a different idea from words like "follower of Jesus" or "apprentice of Jesus"? Can I think of other terms that might be helpful to give a full, accurate picture of what is meant by being a disciple?
- 3. Why does discipleship begin with learning from the teaching of Jesus? Why is the teaching of Jesus foundational for the other aspects of being disciples/followers/apprentices of Jesus?
- 4. Why is character development an essential aspect of being disciples/followers/ apprentices of Jesus? Can I be a disciple merely by learning truths about Jesus, the Kingdom, the world, sin, and righteousness? Why or why not?
- 5. Have I ever thought about the importance of learning from the practices and life rhythms of Jesus? Have I ever taken time to pay attention, not just to Jesus' words and deeds, but specifically to his regular practices and rhythms of life?
- 6. Have I ever considered that Jesus' interactions in training His disciples in the New Testament are almost entirely with a group rather than an individual? Why might I not have noticed this fact?
- 7. How can I grow into the community disciples/followers/apprentices of Jesus at BRCC?
- 8. Who will I call or see to invite to church this week?
