- A. Common theme in literature, movies
- B. Penelope in *Odyssey*; Jane Austen novels
- C. Both seem good at first; major differences
- D. Proverbs young man chooses Wisdom or Folly
- E. Who are they? Who will we choose?

II. Woman Wisdom and Woman Folly

- A. Note the similarities between them
 - 1. Both are women (v1, 13)
 - 2. Both are in a house (v1, 14)
 - 3. Both offering a meal (v2, 17)
 - 4. Both are in the highest point of city (v3, 14)
 - 5. Both are calling out (v3, 15)
 - 6. Both use exact same words (v4, 16)
- B. They could not be more different!
 - 1. Wisdom worker (vv1-2), Folly lazy (14)

- 2. Wisdom offers feast (v2), Folly plain (v17 ESV)
- 3. Wisdom offers her food (v5), Folly stolen (v17)
- 4. Wisdom repent (6); Folly indulge (v17)
 - a. Wisdom pleasure in rich fare
 - b. Folly pleasure in illicit nature
 - c. Arabian proverb; Kidner quote
 - d. Illicit sexual offer (5:15-20)

III. The Choice: Which Woman?

- A. Woman wisdom lays out the choice (vv7-12)
 - 1. Wisdom must correct us we are deformed
 - 2. Will we accept her rebuke or embrace Folly?
- B. The serious nature of this choice
 - 1. You must choose for yourself (v12 ESV)
 - 2. The consequences life or death (v6, 18)
 - e. Wisdom wife; Prov 31; Folly adulteress
 - f. Wisdom/wife life 3:13-18
 - g. Folly/adulteress death 7:24-27 (2:16-18)

 - 2. They reach out especially to the young
- B. Do you recognize the allure of Woman Folly?
 - 1. She is an impostor looking like wisdom/life

 - 1. Are we giving in to the false allure of Folly?
 - 2. Do we accept the rebuke of Woman Wisdom?
- D. Do you see the feast prepared for us?
 - 1. Woman wisdom points to Christ
 - 2. Do we want the false food of world, or True Feast?
 - 3. We have the great feast prepared for us
 - 4. Proverbs 9:5 Come to the Table Communion
