The Integrity of the Wise Proverbs 13:6 December 17, 2006 Communion 1 Thessalonians 5:23-24 The man of integrity walks securely, but he who takes crooked paths will be found out. Proverbs 10:9

The integrity of the upright guides them, but the unfaithful are destroyed by their duplicity. Proverbs 11:3

God is not a man, that he should lie, nor a son of man, that he should change his mind. Does he speak and then not act? Does he promise and not fulfill? Numbers 23:19

They are called the innocent (Ps 64:4 [5]), the blameless (Job 8:20; 9:20-22), the pious and upright (with Rv;v: Job 1:1, 8; 2:3; as par. to μ/Lv ; vyAI Ps 37:37; cf. Prov 29:10). NIDOTTE, H9462.
