Theme: Just as God appointed a day to judge Babylon, so there will be a day when every human will stand before God - either clothed in their own sin or in the righteousness of Christ.

- B. Refers to narrator/one of key characters
- C. But much more than that name is symbolic
- D. Note "CALL me Ishmael"
- E. Drawn from Abraham's son Ishmael
- F. Symbolizes an outcast, orphan, exile
- G. Day of the Lord, Babylon like this as well

II. The Judgment Against Babylon

- A. Isaiah is speaking about historical Babylon
 - 1. He identifies Babylon (v1,19)
 - 2. He mentions the Medes (v17)
- B. Characteristics of Babylon's impending judgment
 - 1. God is bringing it about (13:3-4; day of Lord)
 - 2. Being judged for sin (13:11)
 - 3. Being judged for pride (ls 13:11; 14:12-17)
 - 4. Total judgment (ls 13:6; 13:19-22; 13:10)
 - 5. A remnant chosen and delivered (Is 14:1)

III. Day of the Lord for Babylon & World

- A. Day of the Lord for Babylon
 - 1. Day of the Lord (13:6,9) near, historical
 - 2. Fulfilled in Medo-Persian empire & following
- B. Many day of the Lord's in Scripture (Babylon 539BC)
 - 1. Amos 5:18,20 Israel 722 BC
 - 2. Zeph 1:14 Judah 586 BC
 - 3. Mal 4:5 John the Baptist
 - 4. 1 Thess 5:1-2 return of Christ
 - 5. Historical day and type of future judgment
 - 6. Sinners destroyed God's remnant saved
- C. Babylon historical city/type of wicked world/exile
 - We have seen the historical references many
 - 2. Representative of world 13:11 (10-13)
 - 3. Babel longing for human sovereignty Gen 11
 - 4. Babylon harlot world system Rev 17:5; 18:2
 - a. Note mother of prostitute world systems
 - b. Note judgment like Is 13 desert waste
 - 5. 1 Peter 5:13 Rome as Babylon exile

- D. Day of the Lord, Babylon historical & typological
 - 1. Both refer to real historical events
 - 2. Both part of symbolic apocalyptic language
 - Both refer to the coming judgment of the world

IV. Applying the Word

- A. Do we see how God's Word stood true?
 - 1. The day of the Lord came for Babylon
 - 2. It was a day of searching judgment
 - 3. There was no escape from that day
 - 4. Do we see that God's word will not fail?
- B. Do we see that the day of the Lord will come?
 - 1. God will judge our world for its evil (Rev 20)
 - 2. It will be a searching judgment (describe)
 - 3. None will escape this judgment
 - 4. But it is salvation for God's people
 - 5. The only hope Christ
- C. Communion Protection and Deliverance
 - 1. Christ is our cleft in the rock
 - 2. We are protected by His body and blood

- 3. We look forward to that day as end of exile
- 4. Come to the Table, long for the Day!
