

Deception and Truth In the Last Days

Key idea:

The last days are full of deception, but Christians must strive to be faithful to the truth in their belief and conduct regardless of the consequences.

Key text:

2 Timothy 3:6-13

They are the kind who worm their way into homes and gain control over weak-willed women, who are loaded down with sins and are swayed by all kinds of evil desires, ⁷always learning but never able to acknowledge the truth. ⁸ Just as Jannes and Jambres opposed Moses, so also these men oppose the truth — men of depraved minds, who, as far as the faith is concerned, are rejected. ⁹ But they will not get very far because, as in the case of those men, their folly will be clear to everyone. ¹⁰ You, however, know all about my teaching, my way of life, my purpose, faith, patience, love, endurance, ¹¹persecutions, sufferings — what kinds of things happened to me in Antioch, Iconium and Lystra, the persecutions I endured. Yet the Lord rescued me from all of them. ¹² In fact, everyone who wants to live a godly life in Christ Jesus will be persecuted, ¹³ while evil men and impostors will go from bad to worse, deceiving and being deceived.

Key points:

- 1. The last days will be full of false teachers who deceive others and who themselves have been deceived by the devil.
- 2. The false teachers and their followers are progressing but only further and further into deception and evil.
- 3. Paul again reminds Timothy of his own life and conduct, and how he was faithful even in the face of suffering and persecution.
- 4. Those who desire to be faithful to the truth and godliness in this age of deception and moral decay must be prepared to suffer for their faithfulness.

Questions for discussion/application:

- 1. What part of Sunday's text and teaching stood out most to me? Why?
- 2. Why does Paul link wrong belief and wrong conduct so tightly?
- 3. Does deception lead to wrong conduct, or does wrong conduct open me to deception, or is the relationship more of a never-ending circle?
- 4. Paul compares the false teachers with Jannes and Jambres, the magicians of Pharaoh who opposed Moses. As I meditate on this comparison, what does it tell me about false teachers and about the deceptions they peddle?
- 5. Why does Paul seem to have such harsh words about the immature/weak-willed women who were listening to the false teachers? Is this evidence of misogyny in Paul, or is there something else that was happening? Why does it matter?
- 6. Jesus referred to Satan as "the father of lies" (John 8:44). What does this tell me about the relationship between the false teachers, their heresies, and Satan and his kingdom?
- 7. When I consider some famous examples of mass deception such as Germany during the time of the Nazis why do I think we are susceptible to being deceived? How can I protect myself from being deceived? How can I do this when the deception seems to be universal?
- 8. Paul indicates that everyone who wants to live a godly life in Christ Jesus will be persecuted (v12). What does he mean by 'persecution'? Is it just private belief that brings persecution, or does "live a godly life" indicate something more?
- 9. What do I think is stronger the truth or deception? Why?
- 10. Who will I call to encourage this week? What specific members of BRCC will I commit before God to pray for and call?
