Key Idea: Concealing our sin brings only death, suffering, and pain, but confessing our sin brings life, forgiveness, healing, and true joy.

<u>INTRO</u>

Image: Two men are caught in the sin of adultery; one responds properly to being confronted with his sin, while the other does not.

Need: Each one of us, in our own way and at our own time, will be confronted with the fact that we are a sinner – but what do we do with that?

Subject: Concealing our sin steals joy and impedes forgiveness, but confessing our sin to God brings full forgiveness and complete joy.

Preview: In today's text, we will read a psalm that both warns God's people against hiding their sin and encourages them to confess their sin.

Restatement: David, having experienced both the pain of committing and covering up his sin *and* the joy of having his sin forgiven, warns God's people not to conceal their sins, but rather to confess them and be blessed with forgiveness and joy.

Text: Psalm 32 (read)

BODY

- I. Concealing sin leads to suffering, pain, and death.
 - A. David experienced firsthand the fruits of burying his sin.
 - i. This psalm is believed to have been written after his indiscretion with Bathsheba.
 - 1. Psalm 51 is the psalm asking for forgiveness.
 - 2. Psalm 32 is the psalm celebrating forgiveness having been granted.
 - ii. Initially David tried to hide his sins and cover his tracks.
 - iii. The more he tried to cover up his sin with Bathsheba, the worse things actually got.
 - iv. Not only did he have to exert more energy to keep appearances up, but it also wore on him emotionally, spiritually, *and* physically.
 - B. As humans, we have a predilection toward hiding our sin.
 - i. We are often the mules and horses spoken of in verse 9.
 - 1. We grate against the very thing that we need confession and forgiveness.
 - 2. If unbridled, we will trample everything and everyone around us.
 - ii. Even if we hide our sin, God knows and sees all and we know it!
 - C. So, then, why do we hide our sin and keep ourselves from the only remedy?
 - i. We hide our sin because of pride.

- 1. Some people believe that if nobody says anything about it, and at least *some* people embrace it, it's not really a big deal.
- 2. Some people, especially those in authority and more specifically religious authority, believe that "I can't be seen like this."
- ii. We hide our sin because of shame.
 - 1. We stand in fear of the external, seemingly unending shame of "cancel" culture.
 - 2. We stand in fear of the internal, seemingly unending shame of people finding out exactly the kind of person we really are.
- II. Confessing sin leads to forgiveness, healing, and life.
 - A. The text presents four different pictures of sin being removed.
 - i. The first is someone's trespasses being forgiven.
 - ii. The second is the person's sin being covered by something else.
 - iii. The third is God not holding iniquity against someone.
 - iv. The fourth is deceit, or negligence, not being found in the person's spirit.
 - B. These cover the gamut of sins being forgiven, and the resultant joy that comes from having one's account cleared.
 - i. This covers all people for all time.
 - 1. It covers David, and the Israelites to whom it was read, in the text.
 - 2. It covers Augustine, who cherished Psalm 32 so much it was on the wall as he lay dying.
 - 3. It covers all those who are granted righteousness by faith, according to Paul in Rom. 4:7-8 and that means *us*!
 - ii. This connects the forgiver with the forgiven once more.
 - 1. To be in accord with God is true happiness.
 - 2. To be forgiven is complete joy.
- III. Confession and forgiveness enables us to radiate God's grace to others.
 - A. The way we display God's grace is through the confession of sin.
 - i. It is dishonest to those close to us to act as though we have it all together and do not sin.
 - ii. It is dishonest to an unbelieving world to act as though we have it all together and do not sin.
 - iii. It is dishonest to God to rob him of his glory and delight in forgiving sinners.
 - B. The way we acknowledge God's grace is through the confession of sin.
 - i. Confession of sin, presenting ourselves to God as sinners, is the bedrock of our faith in the work of Christ.
 - ii. In the A-B-Cs of "becoming a Christian," the very first thing is "A: Admit to God that you're a sinner."

- 1. The word confess, broadly speaking, carries a sense of agreement with reality.
- 2. To confess one's sin is to agree that their behavior was sinful.
- iii. It is because of God's faithfulness that we can experience his *chesed*, in spite of our sin.
- iv. This is a core attribute of God's character: his gracious kindness toward sinners.
 - 1. God delights in forgiving the sins of his people.
 - 2. God delights in restored relationship with his people.

- I. Have I confessed my sinfulness and my need for a Savior?
- II. Am I truly walking in the joy of forgiveness, or is there unconfessed sin I am holding onto?
